From our Interim Moderator

Dear members and friends in Cairngryffe Church,

Greetings from Lanark. I am Louise Mackay; minister of St Nicholas Parish church and I now have the privilege and perhaps you have the misfortune of me being your new Interim Moderator during your vacancy and this uncertainty with all things concerning Presbytery planning. I have been minister at St Nicholas for almost 8 years now and very much enjoy life in my parish. Along with my husband Jason whom I married in 2019 Lanark has very much become home. That being said I am very excited to get to know you all better and share this time with you.

I realise that right now we live in uncertain times, not just in regards within the Church of Scotland and the impact that will have on our local churches but also across the world there is much uncertainty, conflict and division. News from the Session

Autumn is the time of year where we not only progress through the seasons but also through the festivals of the church. We have celebrated Harvest and the bounty of the earth; we travel through the season of Remembrance towards Christmas. Our cover picture is of the stained-glass window of Hope and Peace. The window was designed by William Aikman and produced by Powell's Whitefriars Glass in the early 1900's. Aikman was noted for his use of vibrant reds, blues and greens this links in well with Suzanne Campbell's reflection on Autumn and the meaning of the season's associated colours. The Christian Virtues of Hope and Peace are also relevant at this time, see our message from our new Interim Moderator; Louise Mackay. We look forward to working with Louise.

The Rev Dr Elijah Obinna has now demitted his role as our Interim Moderator, as he now takes on the role of Minister of the deferred Union of St Andrews and St Johns Church in Carluke as Carluke Forest Kirk.

The Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Group has now started to work on the Mission Plan. As clusters we are being encouraged to work within our clusters. As a congregation and Session we will face some big changes. Our linkage with Libberton & Quothquan, and Symington will dissolve. We will then join in union with Douglas Valley and Upper Clyde. As a cluster we are being encouraged to start the process of discussing our union and how we will work as a parish together. For example; we will have to decide on a name for our parish, how we organize Sunday worship in the different churches. Jim Watt and I have already attended a roadshow about how to draw up the very formally worded Basis of Union. However, there will be a lot of hard work ahead to work out how we organize ourselves and our work as a charge as we go forward into the future.

The emphasis of the Mission Plan is on Mission; in order to ensure the survival of our church building, we will have to demonstrate that we are using the building not just for Sunday worship but to reach out to the community and use the building for mission activities.

Sometimes these are one off activities some are more regular activities.

During the summer we took part in Doors Open Day, over the 2 days we had a steady stream of visitors. They came for different reasons, some are regular visitors to family graves but had not had the opportunity to visit the church, some came just to see the building and learn a bit more about it. One lady visited because Crear McCartney had been her art teacher but she also had a

family association with William Aikman who created our earlier stained-glass windows.

Our Cairngryffe, Cuppa, Craft and Chat group is a very informal group, probably more chat than crafting takes place. We have also restarted our All-Age worship events on Saturdays; again it's informal with Bible story, arts and crafts and a snack.

It is always a privilege when families share their family life events with us in the church. On the 18th of July 2024, Gillian and Derek Mutch celebrated their 30th Wedding Anniversary by renewing their marriage vows in front of their family and friends. Elijah conducted a very personal service.

On Sunday 2nd of February 2025, we will welcome the Right Reverend Dr Shaw Paterson, the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland to our service. We look forward to Dr Paterson's visit. The last visit by a serving Moderator to the church at Carmichael was 18th April 1920 when Dr William P Paterson dedicated and unveiled the War Memorials.

It is vital to the ongoing survival of our church that we support and develop these events and use the church. As a Session we value the support that you give us, by your attendance at worship and other events we hold, but also your contributions of time, skills and money.

Presbytery Report



At the meeting on 1st June a report was received from the Presbytery Guilds Together, outlining the activities which had taken place in 2023-24 and those planned for 2024-25.

The Trustees' Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2023 were received and approved.

Various building works required on health and safety grounds or to maintain building in a wind and watertight condition were approved, however two congregations were referred to the Congregational Support Committee as they had not obtained the proper permissions before going ahead with works. The financial limits above which permission will be required before work can proceed are to be reviewed.

Intimation was made that the Presbytery Mission Plan had been approved by the Faith Action Programme Leadership Forum and the Mission Plan Action Group were thanked and discharged.

The Governance Group presented a new set of standing orders, some of which were amended, with the business committee asked to review others. The Business committee were also asked to present dates and venues for Presbytery meetings for 2024-25 to the next ordinary meeting, those proposed by the Governance Group having been rejected. The group was thanked and discharged.

The Planning and Implementation Committee urged clusters to continue discussions while they developed the process of implementation.

I was unfortunately unable to attend the meeting on 31st August, so these notes are derived from the minutes of that meeting.

The Rev Derek Gunn, retired minister, latterly of Bo'ness: St Andrews, was installed as moderator for the 2024-25 session.

Following the retiral of Rev Helen Jamieson on 31st August it was noted that the Deferred Union between Carluke: St Andrews and Carluke: St Johns would come into being on 1st September to form Carluke: Forrest Kirk, the service of union being held on the evening of 15th September.

The Rev George Whyte stood down as Interim Clerk and was thanked for his services. Rev Robert Allan was appointed as Clerk on a one day per week basis, with Mr David Watt appointed as Assistant to the Clerk, on the same basis. These appointments until such time as a new Presbytery Clerk is appointed.

The program of meeting dates and venues for the rest of the session was approved. These will be a mixture of in-person and on-line and only on-line, with the former being at locations across Presbytery.

A yearbook is to be published in the Autumn and new email addresses have been set up for each committee, messages to which will be automatically forwarded to the relevant convenor.

In light of the resignation of a significant number of the charity trustees at both Carriden Parish Church and Libberton and Quothquan Church, assessor elders were appointed to these churches with full voting rights as Charity Trustees.

Congregations were encouraged to advertise and for individuals to sign up to attend the online Assisted Dying conversation on 27 November.

A basis of Union has been agreed in the Falkirk area, to create Falkirk: Upper Braes parish and also a basis of incorporation to join Falkirk: Grahamston United Local Ecumenical Partnership and Falkirk: Bainsford.

A Funding Panel has been set up to approve applications under the Presbytery Small Grants Fund and approve and sign off on applications to Seeds for Growth Fund.

Presbytery agreed to the disposal of Libberton & Quothquan Church, noting the agreement of the Kirk Session, and remitted to the General Trustees for determination. The same decision being taken for several other buildings across Presbytery.

Presbytery approved the Financial Limit for Kirk Sessions to spend on Ecclesiastical Buildings as £20,000 inc VAT on a building in a financial year for a building categorised 'A' in the Presbytery Mission Plan and £10,000 inc VAT on a building in a financial year for a building categorised 'B' without application to Presbytery. Again, various building works required on health and safety grounds or to maintain building in a wind and watertight condition were approved, while some applications were rejected as the building was listed for closure in the Presbytery Mission Plan.

Safeguarding trustee training is to be rolled out across Presbytery in conjunction with implementation of the Presbytery Mission Plan.

The next Presbytery Meeting is on Tuesday 29th October 2024 7pm in Falkirk.

A reflection on Autumn Time for a little faith hygge

Be glad, people of Zion, rejoice in the Lord your God, for he has given you the autumn rains because he is faithful.

Joel 2:23



Autumn is often a time when we feel the need to add a little warmth and comfort into our live. We prepare our homes for the coming inclement seasons by setting the fire, bring out the throws and lighting warmly scented candles. We often interject our homes with warm autumnal colours, we prepare to hunker down for the months ahead, indeed we hygge our homes. Hygge is all about embracing feelings of warmth and togetherness. Learning how to appreciate the ordinary and make the most of it. Like going out for a walk in the wind and rain and coming back inside and getting cosy. It is a big part of the Danish way of living that brings greater positivity and a better mindset for dealing with the difficult moments in life. In fact, Danes report on feeling hygge the most when something negative is happening around them, for example being cosy inside when there is a storm raging outside. To really feel and appreciate hygge we need to get used to living in the present. This is a good template for living as a Christian.

Autumn provides us with many opportunities to appreciate the small pleasantries of life, comfortable sweaters, a warm fire, the beautiful colours on the trees and the sound of leaves crunching beneath our feet as we walk. All those things provide a feeling of hygge. This vibrancy and depth of richness can also help us reflect on our relationship with God: warm, rich, vibrant, full of energy and above all colourful

By stopping and taking a moment to consider the colours of autumn we can us these to reflect on our personal relationship with God. Red brings up the thought of passion. We can all agree that Jesus brought great passion to his teaching. Red also reminds us that God sent his own son to spill his blood for our salvation. Therefore, when we look at the red leaves, we should ask ourselves are we reflecting Christ's passion in our own Christianity?

'In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven' Matthew 5:16

Orange reflects warmth and symbolises thoughtfulness and sincerity. As Christians we should seek to be warm and inviting in our care for others.

'Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as Christ God forgave you.' Ephesians 4:32

Yellow conjures up joy and cheerfulness. As Christians our spirit has the joy of knowing that we are walking with Christ. We are charged with sharing this joy with others and reflecting the spirit of Christ in all our personal interactions.

'But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Against such things there is no law' Galatians 5:22-23

Purple is the colour of royalty. Christ is our King, as members of his royalty we should dignified and thoughtful in our care for others.

'The Spirit himself testifies with our spirit that we are God's children. Now if we are children, then we are heirs-heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ, if indeed we share in his sufferings in order that we may also share in his glory.' Romans 8:16-17

Brown is the colour of the earth; this represents stability and anchors all the other colours of autumn. In Christ, we have our anchor.

'So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness.' Colossians 2:6-7

As we appreciate the colours of nature around us this autumn let us ask ourselves are we prepared to fully display our Christian colours in the way we interact with those around us, do we reflect Christ's warmth and vibrancy and in doing so help other to follow him. Take time this autumn to hygge your faith. Stop, reflect, be present and appreciate the warmth and care that faith provides and consider how best we can share God's love with others.
