

MINISTER'S LETTER

The BBC is currently celebrating the 75th year of 'Desert Island Discs' on the Radio. The format is for a celebrity guest to be offered a prolonged stay, alone, on a desert island. They can take eight records with them, and are interviewed about why they chose these records – and each one sparks memories. Over two thousand people have been guests of this programme, and through it shared some fascinating insights into their lives - sometimes very poignant, sometimes funny, always emotional. This is the 'soundtrack of our lives', as someone once said. Most of us, even if we are not enthusiastic music fans, could create such a 'soundtrack', and if we shared it with others, many memories would come alive in the sharing.



In this issue of our magazine we profile a project, 'Playlist for Life' working with people with dementia, which uses that idea of 'connecting music, people and memories' to open up new possibilities for families to continue sharing together. Using technology to benefit others.

There are many significant ways that we can use modern technology in our efforts to 'be church.' The broader church is constantly exploring this. Of course, technology has many down sides – it can be used in many bad ways, as we mention in the article about 'Data Protection'. But it is really refreshing when we put our minds to using scientific understanding and technology in ways that benefit us all.

We walk a bit of a tightrope in this present age – on the one hand, we have created a nightmare of weapons whose ability to destroy is beyond our comprehension – on the other, we have had remarkable advances in medical science that extend both the length and the quality of so many lives.

The ways we explore and develop technology are simply an extension of who we are – so, if we live in fear, we orient scientific and technological discovery towards a fearful end. If we live for peace and harmony, we seek technology that can benefit all of humanity.

It does feel that the Playlist for Life motto: "connecting music, people, and memories" is expressing something much broader than its specific tasks. It is about using our technology to 'connect', to open up new ways of valuing each other. It is, in fact, another small but important model of how we can use our imagination, and what we have around us, in Gospel ways.

*Gracious God, we are awesomely and wonderfully made—in your image.
May we show our thanksgiving, love and respect of you by respecting at
the deepest level the life, and the inner life, of other people.*

Looking back, thanks are in order to the ladies who decorated the Church for the Christmas Season as well as to James Warnock who provided us with a beautiful, fresh tree after we learned that the Carmichael Estate was unable to provide us with one in 2016.

Thanks also to the new members of the Worship Group who participated in the preparation and delivery of the Watchnight Service which was very well attended – and of course the Church Bell joyously rang out at midnight, to the delight of some young local residents in Carmichael.

We have had two babies baptised in recent months, with another coming up shortly and also two weddings booked for future months. We now look forward to the Easter Celebrations which are almost upon us and, in particular, to our Joint 'Palm and Passion' Sunday Service in Cairngryffe Church on Sunday April 9th, which heralds the beginning of our services throughout Holy Week.

Sadly, I have to report that after 10 years of operating in the Clydesdale area, and due to the retirement of the Convenor, New Beginnings Clydesdale will be changing course somewhat in the second quarter of 2017. They will no longer be providing Home Starter Packs to new tenants. However the urgent need for white goods has been identified as a very necessary project and this will be their new direction commencing at the beginning of April. The premises in Carluke will be closed and the project will be administered by one of the Trustees from a home office base.

PRESBYTERY REPORT

Following the appointment of Rev Bryan Kerr as Presbytery Clerk, a formal contract has been drawn up and agreed.

As a result of two of its members having retired from Presbytery Rev George Shand has been appointed as convenor of the Complaints Committee and Rev Maudeen MacDougall and Mrs Anne Cochrane will join with the existing members.

As a result of the Local Church Review visit to Coalburn linked with Lesmahagow Old, discussions are taking place between the Kirk Sessions and the Ministries Committee over the future shape of ministry in the area.

At the December meeting a presentation was given on 'Grasping the Nettle with the God Question'. This gave an outline of a set of DVD's and supporting literature for those who wish to explore further the relationship between God and science, the overarching theme being that there is no conflict between scientific knowledge and belief in God.

The Overture on the Registration of Ministers, which was sent down to Presbyteries at the 2016 General Assembly, was approved. This seeks to establish a central registry of all ministers and their field of ministry and will go before the General Assembly in May for final approval.

The vacancy at Douglas Valley has been sisted temporarily while they undergo a local Church Review. Under the Act governing vacancies, Presbytery is required to review the situation after two years. The congregation are facing a number of challenges and have themselves asked for support. The review will seek to establish what the best nature of that support will be.

The 'Big Question' rally which was held in November was well received and the World and Community issues Committee are looking at possible future topics. These include :- The issues surrounding the present day situation in Israel/Palestine, Mental Health needs - theological and pastoral responses, and including people with learning disabilities in our life and worship

Presbytery are seeking to employ the services of a consultant over the next 5 years to assist in the training of people to carry out Local Church Review Visits with the aim of establishing a group from whom teams can be drawn to carry these out. The 5 year period will allow every congregation to be visited and it is hoped that, as a result of their experience of undergoing such a visit, one or two members of each congregation might be willing to join the group. Those congregations which have already undergone a Review have found it positive and helpful in developing their Christian witness.

BEING CHURCH - in the local community

There are many interesting examples of how local congregations have initiated projects that 'bring life' to needs they have identified within their communities. Here is one example from South Lanarkshire.



'Playlist for Life' is a Scottish and UK charitable organisation, which originated in Glasgow, as the idea of the broadcaster Sally Magnusson after her experience of her mother's dementia.

"Being able to respond to music is the one thing dementia cannot destroy," says Playlist for Life, "We encourage and help families and caregivers to create a playlist of personally meaningful music on an iPod for people with dementia."

There is growing evidence that if people with dementia are offered frequent access to the music in which their past experience and memories are embedded, it can improve their present mood; improve their awareness; improve their ability to understand and think; and help their sense of identity and independence.

St. Andrew's Church in Carluke has recently been awarded a grant from the Aviva Community Fund to introduce Playlist for Life into their 'Drop-In support for people with memory difficulties and their carers'.

The 'Drop-In Support' began in November 2012 with the support of Alzheimer Scotland and the Local Community Psychiatric Nursing Team. It meets on the last Friday of the month, (1pm to 3pm) and there is also now an activity session on the second Friday of each month which encompasses the development of a Playlist for Life 'hub'.

The Aviva funds will be used to provide ten kits made up of an iPod shuffle, two sets of headphones per iPod, a splitter cable and a Playlist Memory Book. The individual and a carer can listen to the tracks at the same time, and share the memories that arise.



"The 'Drop in' is a safe and comfortable place where people can receive friendship and support as well as build relationships with other people" says Rev. Helen Jamieson. "Currently, we have around 75 regular users, with about 50 attending the Drop in Support each month. It clearly meets a need not only in Carluke but in the surrounding area and we are constantly developing the project and hope it will become intergenerational, with younger people from BBs and High School bringing their technical skills to assist with Playlist for Life."


TELL OUT MY SOUL HYMN 286

Timothy Dudley-Smith's beautiful version of Mary's Song, the Magnificat, in Luke's Gospel (1:46-56), was first published in 1962, and is still a world-wide favourite for new hymn books. Timothy was born in Manchester in 1926, ordained a priest in the Church of England in 1951 and was Bishop of Thetford when he retired in 1992. He has received many awards for his hymn writing, including in 2003, an OBE.

Timothy has written and published over 400 hymn texts. He does not write music – all his texts are to well-known tunes.

Timothy loved to write poetry. He was in his middle 30's when some friends, producing a book of new hymns, asked him if he had ever written hymns. Timothy laughed. 'I love to celebrate my faith in words,' he said, 'but I have absolutely no ear for music.' But they persisted – 'perhaps you have a poem on a Christian theme that is written in meter,' they said. It just so happened he had recently written one, and he sent it to them. They found a good tune to go with it – 'Woodlands' - and published it in their hymn-book in 1962.

That was 'Tell Out My Soul' – his first hymn ever published. And it began Timothy's hymn-writing career – his style is mainly 'new words to old tunes'. He began writing at a time when there was a new demand in the church for contemporary hymns, and because he chose established tunes, and wrote his verse in a traditional way (but without any archaisms), his hymns often acted as a bridge between the old and the more modern hymns. And they are very suited for Sunday worship.



In a recent interview on Radio 2, he was asked to comment on how good hymns nowadays no longer stay restricted to one particular tradition or denomination – they cross boundaries.

This was partly due, he said, to programmes like 'Songs of Praise', that open out the songs of different traditions to a wider public. But also, quoting the poet TS Eliot, he said that as human beings we are born with a sense of rhythm. It begins in the womb, as we develop close to our mother's heart-beat; it continues in the rhythm of the stories we

enjoy as children; there's a rhythm in the changing of the seasons. The whole of life has a natural beat – rhythm resonates through everything.

So we could say of well-known hymns, like many written by Timothy Dudley-Smith, that they are popular because they touch a rhythm deep inside us.

THE WORLD CHURCH

The Church of Scotland has a global vision, which is well reflected at our General Assembly when delegates from churches all over the world stand and speak. Last May at Tinto Parishes we met Rev. Andrew Chulu from the United Church of Zambia. He spoke powerfully to us about the impact of Climate Change on his country.

The Church of Scotland has had long-term ecumenical contacts with Zambia, and today, many individual congregations have Twinning Partnerships with Zambian congregations. Our World Mission Council, in partnership with the Methodist Church, also supports **KEITH AND IDA WADDELL** as Mission Partners. Since 2004 they have been based at the Mwandu Mission of the United Church of Zambia (which includes a church, a Hospital, a group of schools, a centre for orphans and vulnerable children, and a retirement home). They have two children—Mubita and Catriona.

Here is an extract from one of their letters to Partner Churches in Scotland.



"Zambia hosts 54,000 refugees, of whom approximately 20,000 are from the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). Amongst this number are a family of six whom we've come to know simply as "our family".

"We met our family when a district social work officer asked Ida for help with four boys who were living in prison with their mother. They had fled from the DRC, where their home had been attacked and insurgents killed their grandparents. Children's passports in the DRC cost \$300 each, plus a 'facilitation fee'. The parents could not afford this, so they walked into Zambia without these passports – and were subsequently jailed for 15 months each.

"There are no orphanages in Western Province, so the children would have to be split up and sent to children's homes in different parts of Zambia. We were the only officially registered foster parents in Western Province, and the Court handed the children over to us for the duration of the parents' imprisonment. They lived with us and we became close to the parents too. Once a month, we would take the boys to visit their parents, bringing food parcels to supplement the rather spartan prison fare.

"The next problem was that the boys' parents were classed as 'prohibited immigrants' and the family would be expelled back to where they had fled from—where their lives were in danger. We could not permit this, so we lobbied behind the scenes to have their status changed to refugees. On the parents' release, they were allocated places at Mayukwayukwa Refugee Centre. We keep in touch via Facebook Messenger and try to send them some money from time to time. We are the grandparents now!"

We started a Pilot Facebook page last year to update intermittently with Church News and pictures – for example some of our lovely Christmas displays - and also with news that is more community oriented, like pictures of our In-Service Day Club, or school events in the Church.

And we are finding that while we don't have many people who want to see everything – called 'Friends' or 'followers' and they 'Like' the page – there are a lot of other people who come to our page after these events to have a look - this is called our 'Reach'.

Simply put, we have less than 20 'followers', but our 'reach' can sometimes be over 100 people. It is beginning to look like Facebook is actually connecting with our broader community in new ways.

This is a resource we are still learning how to use to good effect. What we now aim to do is connect it to our Websites, and start updating it more regularly with news.

THE CHURCH AND DATA PROTECTION LEGISLATION.

In this digital age, we are becoming increasingly aware of the risk of 'scams' that rob us of our money, by giving someone access to our bank accounts, or to our computers. It is easy to become a victim because some of these scams sound so plausible. We must be constantly on our guard.



Organisations must be careful too. We give personal information to banks, government departments, and shops, etc—and we expect it will be kept securely, and be used for the right purposes.

However, that can't be guaranteed, which is why Data Protection legislation has developed – to ensure all organisations handle information about us in a way we are happy with, and also that they store it securely.

The Church is an organisation, with information about its members, and it too must have the highest of standards. The Church of Scotland has produced Data Protection Policies for each congregation to adopt and to work to. And every congregation must appoint a Data Protection Officer - who monitors our use of data, and is named, so individual members can make contact.

Most of the information the church holds is basic – names and addresses of members, so elders can visit; so information, like this newsletter, can reach you. You will have given these details willingly as part of your membership.

But it can be more detailed - some office bearers may have your telephone number or email address; our Treasurer may have financial information you have shared with us. The Minister may have personal information gleaned for weddings, or baptisms or funerals. And at every level the church has a responsibility to store that information securely, and only keep what we have a real reason for keeping. And you must be confident that we do that.

OUR HOLY WEEK JOURNEY

Starting on 'Palm and Passion' Sunday and continuing through the week until Easter is the 'Holy Week Journey'.

It is the powerful, deeply meaningful Journey of Jesus and his disciples from his entry to Jerusalem to his crucifixion, and on to Easter resurrection.

It is our journey too, as every evening at 7pm, many of us take the opportunity to gather together in worship to remember and experience again the events of the week as Luke relates them in his Gospel. We are together as the Tinto Parishes community for evening worship from Monday 10th April to Good Friday 14th April, spiritually journeying as we share powerful moments, thoughts and prayers –and physically too as we move during the week between our three churches.

This year there we have been an additional journey to explore. On Tuesday 11th April the speaker at our worship in Libberton & Quothquan Church will be **Rev. Elizabeth Clelland**.

Last summer Elizabeth set off on a walking pilgrimage – following the 'Camino de Santiago', the 'Santiago Way'. For centuries, pilgrims have walked through Spain following the paths to Santiago de Compostela, and the Tomb of St. James (the brother of John).



Elizabeth describes it as both a spiritual and a prayerful walk, and she will use her experience as the basis for her exploration of verses from Luke's Gospel. As this is also our April 'Prayer & Praise' service, the themes of 'prayer', 'praise', and 'journey' will all come alive together on **Tuesday 11th April at 7pm in Libberton & Quothquan Church**.


'PALM AND PASSION' SUNDAY

OUR JOINT TINTO PARISHES WORSHIP, at 11am on Sunday 9th April, in Cairngryffe Church, will follow a similar approach to the very successful service we held last year. As many of our youngsters as we can muster will be involved in the Palm Sunday procession, and our worship teams will lead us through Luke's telling of Christ's Passion. As we did last year, we will use lots of symbols with which to tell our story.



And for the youngsters, afterwards, there will be an Easter Egg Hunt.

OUR COVER PICTURE appeared on one of our 'orders of service' from last year. The statue is found in St Peter's and St Paul's cemetery in Naperville, Illinois, a beautifully carved interpretation of St. Francis of Assisi, often called the patron saint of animals. It is a charming picture that works on many levels.



The statue with St. Francis bending to notice the small carved bird conveys the sense of humility that is always associated with Francis - that he notices and can come close to something so small is important spiritually. But then there is also a real bird there, which adds to the charm of the picture. And it feels deeply meaningful.



However, we have discovered that it is a bit of a cheat. The original photographer complained on her website that someone had 'photoshopped in' the real bird and then circulated it. So, it only exists in the computer world. But if we see it as a vision of something that indeed could have happened when no one was looking, then it still retains its charm.

Bubblegum 'n Fluff.

If you get rid of the fluff around Christmas, you can find the substance. 'Bubblegum 'n Fluff' is a programme devised to help Primary 6 age children get closer to the 'substance'. In December last year, Alex Kelly of Clydesdale Christian Youth Trust, led Rev. George and four members of our congregations in delivering the two hour programme to Tinto Primary, class 6. This was a trial run for us doing it ourselves next year.



Everyone agreed it was a great success—and you will hear more about it in the Autumn.
